


SEPTEMBER 14 BOOK SIGNING AT AUTOBOOKS

RACING HISTORY SERIES EVENT

An upcoming event you won't want to miss is the Racing History Project, arranged by Dave Wolin, on Saturday, October 12 at the Valley Relics Museum in the San Fernando Valley area of Los Angeles. 7900 Balboa Blvd., Lake Balboa, CA 91406 (Van Nuys).

This exciting event will focus on two iconic former racetracks, Paramount Ranch, the Santa Monica Mountains location that hosted five sports car races and two stock car races in 1956 and 1957, and San Fernando Dragstrip, the iconic Glenoaks Blvd. track, where from 1955 to 1969 local and nationally known dragracers competed head to head.

The program begins at 10:30 AM with an hour and a half slide show, film and panel discussion about Paramount Ranch, presented by author Tony Baker (*Central Coast Motorsports, Hot Rodding in Ventura County* and his newly released book, *Southern California Road Racing*). After a lunch break to enjoy some of the gourmet food trucks in the parking lot, the 1:00 PM to 2:30 PM segment will feature San Fernando Dragstrip, with a slide show, film and panel discussion, emceed by broadcast journalist Steve Ford, best known on local radio as "The Car Guy".

Panelists will include Alice Hanks, John Dixon, Bill Watkins, Art Evans, Tim Considine, Ron Cummings, Allen Kuhn and others who participated or raced at these iconic locations, telling stories never heard before about their experiences. This is a rare opportunity to hear from those who were there. There are a limited number of tickets (\$25) available and must be purchased in advance. Note - NO tickets will be available the day of the event. To purchase

After the event, there will be an autograph and personal "meet and greet" session as well as some noted photographers and authors on hand offering their wares and memorabilia for sale. THE SAN FERNANDO VALLEY - A REMEMBRANCE OF THINGS PAST

The Valley was a semi-rural suburb with long straightaways connecting to less traveled mountain roads to the north and south. On the east you had Ed Winfield grinding cams in his Glendale warehouse and Frank Kurtis building his cars. On the west end you had Paramount Ranch and a fantastic network of mountain roads. Downtown Los Angeles and Hollywood Blvd. was a 25 cent Red Car ride away. You could cruise up to Bonelli Stadium Sunday afternoon and watch Billy Vukovich whip the "run what ya brung" V8-60 crowd, or pop over the hill down to Gilmore Stadium on Wednesday nights and watch Sam Hanks master his Offy.

We had a number of "sand lot" drag strips, two or three miles with no side roads. One was Canoga Avenue, three miles from Ventura Blvd. to Van Owen St. No side roads, high crowned, two-lanes with culverts and pepper trees on both sides. At over a hundred miles an hour, in a '29 Model A with mechanical brakes, you only noticed the center line. (Even in the 50s the Pomona road course had a row of trees on the back straight.)

The big time was Sepulveda Blvd. at midnight on Wednesdays. Sepulveda came to life when the police shut down Pic's Drive-In and Washington Place in Culver City. Sepulveda terminated at Highway 99 in Sylmar. It was three-lane concrete and it ran three miles south between the Van Norman Lakes Reservoirs that William Mulholland had built. A ticket for a mechanical violation with the notation "at hot rod races" could mean three days in the cooler.

When legal drag strips arrived, I was in the Far East. When I got back, sports cars had arrived, and we made our mischief on Topanga Canyon and Mulholland Drive.

Dave Wolin's Racing History Series Event on October 12 will have a special meaning for me having lived and loved in the Paramount hills.

As you may know already, I've been hard at work on an audiobook version of my 1950's motorsports novel *The Last Open Road* for the past three years and we finally finished & launched it at the big W.I.C. vintage meet at Road America last weekend. I signed & hawked copies alongside David Hobbs and Brian Redman (both of who,like a lot of other major motorsports celebrities, played parts in the narrative) and the response was pretty damn incredible.

What makes the audiobook unique is that I re-wrote the novel as a 1950s radio play, complete with different character voices, professional voice actors and production talent, sound effects, period music, authentic car sounds (MGTCs, Jag 120s and C-types, a 4.1 liter Ferrari and thanks to Frank Simeone of the Simeone Foundation Museum in Philadelphia, a genuine period-correct Cad Allard and one of the three legit Cunningham C4Rs on the planet) and Mystery Celebrity Guest Voices - like Mr. Hobbs and Mr. Redman, Skip Barber, Ray Evernham, Tommy Kendall, Bill Warner, John Morton, Patrick Long, Spencer Pumpelly, P. D. Cunningham, Mark Greene, Marino Franchitti, etc. - in many of the supporting roles.
